The COVID pandemic has impacted our lives in many ways, including our communications, physical interaction with each other and how we spend our holiday time. The ADSA has invested in improving our digital communications including the use of Zoom meetings, e-newsletters, Facebook, Instagram and a dedicated YouTube channel. We will be continuing with a hardcopy newsletter twice a year for those members who do not have access to email at this time.

With the country still focused on making events as safe as possible, the ADSA has made the following decisions:

- 1. Regrettably we have decided to cancel this year's annual ADSA Christmas Picnic. Given the size of this event, the best health advice would suggest we wait until we are mostly safely vaccinated in 2022.
- 2. Asbestos Awareness Week (22-26 November) will be focused on WA holidaymakers. With travel very much restricted to a state level for the foreseeable future. we felt compelled to release our awareness campaign ahead of November, to warn travelers for the upcoming school holidays. We are also hoping a permanent memorial of the Wittenoom tragedy in Karijini National Park will act as a deterrent to tourists tempted to put their lives and their children's at risk for a social media post.
- 3. Given the lack of memorial to all those lost to deadly asbestos diseases, our 26th Annual **Ecumenical Memorial Service** will go ahead on Friday 26 November with precautions. It will also be professionally live streamed to our Facebook page for those unable to attend. Once again, we will have a

- 4. We are confident that we will be able to go ahead with our annual fundraising Golf Day hosted by Vice President Dave Hall, on Sunday 27 February 2022 in Mandurah. In 1948, while working as a young flying doctor in the Pilbara, he wrote to the WA Health Department stating, "That ABA [Company] would produce the most lethal crop of asbestos diseases in the worlds literature". This year, the 29th annual award was presented by Rose Marie Vojakovic AM to Professor Gary Lee (pictured with ADSA President, Robert Vojakovic AM JP).

Congratulations to Professor Gary Lee

As a professor of respiratory medicine at the University of Western Australia and a respiratory physician at Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital in Perth, Professor Lee established and directs Australia's first centralised hospital pleural service. He has won successive fellowships from the National Health and Medical Research Council and is currently a recipient of a prestigious Practitioner Fellowship.

Prof Lee is a recognised world leader in pleural research and leads his translational research group at the Institute for Respiratory Health. As most asbestos complications relate to the pleura, his research has directly benefited patients with asbestos related diseases. As we well know, WA has the highest rate of mesothelioma per capita in the world, so we are very fortunate that Prof Lee chose to specialise and

perfect his work with the indwelling pleural catheter here.

Our members speak of Prof Lee's care, kindness, patience, compassion and wisdom at their greatest time of need and the future that they are facing. From the ADSA and our members, we would like to extend our heartfelt 'thank you' to Prof Lee for his contribution to enhancing the quality of life for patients affected by asbestos diseases.

Permanent Memorial Update

We are delighted with the momentum. We now have over 4000 signatures, but we'd love to get more than 10,000.


We have approached the State Government about the construction of permanent memorials in Perth and the Pilbara. The meeting was very positive and it was felt it should be linked with the Wittenoom Closure Bill 2021. We have created a link on our website whereby we can collect and collate ideas sent to us. The feedback to date has been very specific, with the most important being:

- The names of loved ones lost included on any memorial, with additional space for those to come
- The memorial in Karijini National Park in the Pilbara for those lost directly attributed to the mining, milling, living, visiting, working, schooling and transporting of asbestos from Wittenoom and the surrounding areas e.g. Point Samson
- Special consideration and input by the Traditional Owners of the land on how their loved ones lost should be incorporated into the memorial
- The Perth asbestos memorial should be broader and include not only occupational exposures such as tradies, wharfies, and workers from James Hardie plants and Government Railways, but also non-occupational exposures such as housewives (washing work clothes), DIY renovators etc.

We were recently offered a space in Solidarity Park (Harvest Tce West Perth) by Unions WA as part of their update to the small 1970s site. Currently we have the plaque, which we placed in 2018. However, realistically we would need most of Solidarity Park to create a memorial to accommodate all the current names of those lost and indeed those to be lost in the future. So we will continue our discussions with the Unions to see if they can assist us further.

Memorial Design

It has been suggested we look at the design of the H.M.A.S. Sydney II memorial in Geraldton (pictured below). This monument commemorates the 645 service personnel who died when their ship sank during the war in 1941. This was designed by local artists Smith Sculptors who specialise in memorials. Legalisation Update

The Asbestos Diseases Compensation Bill 2013 was introduced on 31 October 2013 by the Hon. Kate Doust MLC, at the time Deputy Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Council. We have been advised The Attorney General the Hon. John Quigley MLA that a bill will be introduced into this term of Government to: Remove "once for all" damages and introduce provisional damages for asbestos related diseases provision.

Our organisation is also to be consulted in the drafting of this, so we will keep you posted on the timing of this Bill. While long overdue, this will be great news for many sufferers and their families. However, we will still need to campaign for the inclusion of gratuitous damages i.e. to provide compensation for the loss or impairment of the injured person's capacity to perform domestic services for another person.

This is very important particularly as most sufferers have responsibilities as parents, grandparents or carers of a loved one. It seems very unfair that Western Australians are statute barred when residents from NSW, Victoria, Qld, ACT, and SA have access to this compensation.

Many thanks to Mr David Michael MLA Balcatta for keeping us updated on the progress of this legislation.

Advisory Service Update

The Advisory Service is following government health protocols and taking a very cautious approach to ensure our members and friends are protected when attending our premises. However, the careful approach by the WA Government has meant we are feeling confident to commence our program of support groups and information sessions for the last quarter of this year. Our first series of guest speakers will be on a range of approaches to Pain Management.

The building boom in WA has pushed our office renovations back to mid-October. These have been supported by our caring local member Mr David Michael MLA via a communities grant. On behalf of our staff and members we are extremely grateful.

ADSA PhD Mesothelioma Medical Research Scholarships

We have discussed the great value our program has brought to supporting our members and friends especially as we **do not have dedicated asbestos diseases research Government Funding in WA**. Ironic, considering we have the highest incidence of mesothelioma in Australia. One person in Australia dies every 12 hours from incurable mesothelioma cancer. The first recipient Dr Melvin Chin Oncologist/Scientist is now a treating Oncologist at Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital. We will be launching our broader PhD Scholarship program in early 2022. **Please note:** Donations to our scholarships are 100% tax deductible.

Dedicated WA Dust Diseases Medical Research & Treatment Funding

Whilst we are concerned for our workers and home renovators developing dust diseases, we are also now concerned for the tourists who have visited Wittenoom over the last few decades. Our research has uncovered that in 1993 alone, an estimated 40,000 tourists visited Wittenoom and the surrounding area. We also know there has been a lot of mixed messaging to tourists over the years. As asbestos cancers have a latency period of approximately 20-50 years, those who visited Wittenoom in 1993 should consider commencing health checks, especially if they were smokers.

There is no safe level of exposure to asbestos especially in relation to deadly mesothelioma cancer. Considering WA has the highest incidence of malignant mesothelioma in Australia, it would be in our citizens' best interest to create a dedicated Dust Diseases Research and Treatment Fund for medical research into, not only mesothelioma cancer, but also silicosis and other dust diseases. We need to understand more about these diseases and our researchers should not be competing with other chronic disease research funding. There should be a strong desire by Government and industry to create this urgently, especially as these diseases are entirely preventable.

Asbestos Awareness Week 22-26 November 2021

We were alerted by the media about a year ago to a number of videos circulating online of so-called 'adventure tourists' camping and playing in the asbestos tailings in Wittenoom, in the Pilbara region of WA. This concerned us - after all the deaths and the fact Wittenoom continues to devastate families, people were still choosing to visit the deadly blue asbestos contaminated town. This led us to research why the message and the warning signs were not getting through.

Our research also highlighted that both The New Zealand Herald and the UK Daily Mail have published numerous articles in recent years, warnings their citizens not to visit Wittenoom.
